REFERENCE TO CONTEXT

1-A Bird Came Down the walk

Reference: These lines have been taken from the poem "The Echoing Green" written by Emily Dickinson.

Context: The poem explores the interaction between nature and humanity. It describes a bird's instinctive behavior-eating a worm and drinking dew-followed by its cautious reaction to the speaker. The poem highlights both the brutality and the delicate beauty of nature, contrasting the bird's raw survival instincts with the grace of its flight.

Multiple Explanation

In these lines, the poet presents a vivid and close observation of a bird's activities in the natural world. The bird, unaware of being watched, acts on its survival instincts by biting an Angeworm in halves and eating the fellow Raw It then drinks Dew from a convenient grass and hops sidewise to let a Beetle pass showing a mix of brutality and politeness. The bird glances all around with rapid eyes that look like frightened Beads, revealing its Cautious and alert nature in a dangerous world. When the poet offers it a

Crumb as a gesture of kindness, the bird becomes afraid and unrolls its feathers to fly away. The poet describes this flight with beautiful imagery, comparing the bird's wings to Cars that divide the ocean without leaving a seam, or butterflies leaping Plashless off banks of noon. This description emphasizes the softness, grace, and silence of the bird's movement as it returns to its Softer home / highlighting the unbridgeable gap between the human observer and the wild creature.

2-The Echoing Green

Reference: These lines have been taken from the poem "The Echoing Green" written by William Blake.

Context: This poem celebrates the cycle of life and the harmony between nature and humans. It depicts a cheerful spring day where the sunrise brings joy, birds sing, and children play. The poem connects the innocence of youth with the nostalgia of old age, ending with the setting sun representing the end of life or rest.

Multiple Explanation

In these lines, the poet paints a cheerful picture of a spring day on the green field. The sun Arises to make the skies happy, and the Merry bells ring to welcome the season. Birds like the Skylark and Thrush sing loudly in the bushes, adding to the joyful sounds of the children playing sports. The older generation, represented by Old John with white hair, sits under the Oak tree and laughs away their Care They watch the children with nostalgia, recalling the days when they, too, enjoyed such Joys in their own Youth. However, as the day progresses, the sun Descends and the sports come to an end. The children become Weary and gather round the Laps of their mothers like birds resting in a nest. The cheerful "Echoing Green" transforms into a quiet, Darkening Green symbolizing the inevitable passage of time and the journey from the energy of youth to the restfulness of old age.

3-Those Winter Sundays

Reference: These lines have been taken from the poem "Those Winter Sundays" written by Robert Hayden.

Context: The poem reflects on the poet's regret for failing to appreciate his father's silent sacrifices during his childhood. It portrays the father's selfless love, shown through his hard labor to keep the family warm and comfortable on freezing Sundays, acts which went unthanked at the time.

Multiple Explanation

In these lines, the poet looks back with deep regret at how his father used to wake up early in the Blueblack cold of winter mornings to light the fires. Despite his Cracked hands that ached from the hard Labor of the week, the father performed these duties faithfully to drive out the cold. The poet remembers waking up to hear the cold Splintering and breaking as the house warmed up. He admits that as a child, he spoke Indifferently to his father, never realizing the effort behind these acts. He also recalls the fear of the Chronic angers of that house, which made him distant. The father even Polished his good shoes, yet no one ever thanked him. Now, as an adult, the poet asks himself, "What did I know?" realizing too late that these Austere and lonely Offices were actually powerful expressions of selfless love.

3-Ruba'iyat

Reference: These lines have been taken from the poem "Ruba'iyat" written by Allama Muhammad Iqbal.

Context: In these lines, Iqbal emphasizes the importance of true Faith (ایمان) and self-respect. He criticizes the spiritual emptiness of Western civilization and laments the lack of unity and passion among modern Muslims. He urges Muslims to regain the spirit of Hazrat Abraham (A.S.) and connect with their spiritual center, Makkah.

Multiple Explanation

In these lines, the poet declares that true faith requires the courage of Abraham (A.S.), who stood firm at the Stake He warns the modern man that having no faith is worse than Slavery as it enslaves the soul. Iqbal criticizes the Civilization of Europe, stating it is empty of Concord because it does not bow to Makkah or follow divine guidance. He contrasts the "Music of strange lands" (Western culture) with "Islam's fire" (spiritual passion), asserting that the nation's harmony depends on this inner fire. He mourns that the Muslims have lost their Passion and love for God; their Veins now carry thin blood. symbolizing weakness. Their Ranks are broken, their hearts are Perplexed and their prayers have become Cold Iqbal asserts that without the inner spiritual feeling deeper than the skin, the Muslim nation cannot recover its lost dignity.

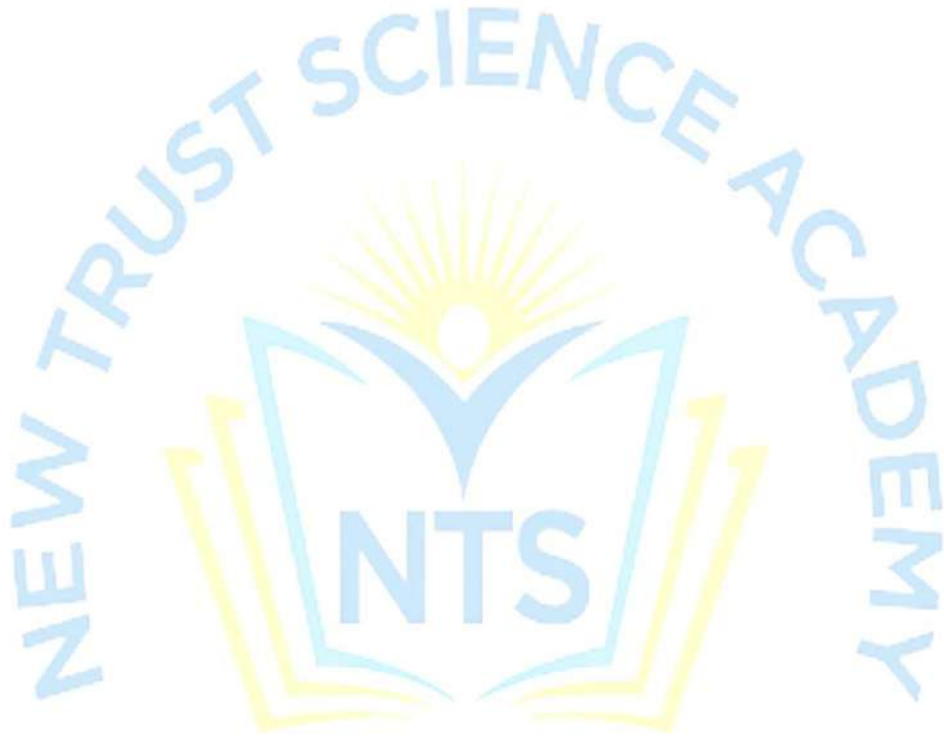
